General conference information

The Organising Committee has the pleasure of inviting you to Perth, Western Australia, for *Palaeo Down Under 3 (PDU3)* in July 2023.

Palaeo Down Under is the Australasian Palaeontologists' main conference, and aims to highlight palaeontological research, education and outreach throughout Australasia. This is the third conference held, following the inaugural conference in Orange, New South Wales in 2000, and PDU2 held in Adelaide in 2016. Each conference spotlights the palaeontology of the host state, with PDU1's central theme of Paleozoic correlations of the New England region, and PDU2 focused on Ediacaran/Cambrian palaeontology. Early life and microbialites will likely be a key theme for the Perth conference, although the full program will cover palaeontological research across Australia, New Zealand and neighbouring countries.

Venue

The conference will be based within multiple venues within the Perth Cultural Centre. Delegates will be responsible for their own lunches on conference days, and ample time will be provided for this.

Located within the heart of Perth city, the Cultural Centre is a vibrant, inclusive and attractive draw card for Perth residents and visitors alike. The precinct is made up of the Art Gallery of WA, WA Museum Boola Bardip, State Library of WA, The Blue Room, PICA (Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts), the State Theatre Centre of WA and North Metropolitan TAFE. Situated between the Perth city train station and Northbridge's retail, food and beverage and entertainment precinct, the Cultural Centre is a dynamic and lively public space with free WiFi.

Travel and accommodation

Perth is well connected by air with other Australian capital cities and locations around the world.

Delegates will need to make their own accommodation arrangements for the conference period. Accommodation to suit all budgets is readily available in the Perth central business district.

Registration

Palaeo Down Under 3 meets the criteria for the Memorandum of Understanding between the Geological Society of Australia (of which AAP is a specialist group) and the Geological Society of New Zealand (GSNZ), which came into effect on 1 December 2013. By this arrangement, GSNZ members will be able to attend the conference at AAP member rates.

For the general public, attendance at plenary lectures will be offered for a nominal fee of **\$15** per session. The five plenary lectures will be held in the morning of each conference day; i.e. Monday 10 July to Friday 14 July inclusive.

Registration for general public plenary lectures and conference trips will be available at a later date.

Icebreaker reception

An icebreaker reception will be held at the Western Australian Museum Boola Bardip in Hackett Hall. This is an ideal opportunity to meet fellow participants, while enjoying canapes and wines within this stunning historic building all under the blue whale skeleton.

About the venue: Built in 1913 as an extension to the original State Library, Hackett Hall is steeped in history. Restoration works highlight the ornate pressed tin ceilings, original frescoes and Western Australian crafted stonemasonry and carpentry. The mezzanine level showcases the original library bookcases and spiral staircases. Suspended from the central hall is the Museum's blue whale. Found washed ashore in Busselton in 1897, this 24-metre skeleton is positioned in a dynamic lunge-feeding position. On the ground level, view the Stan Perron WA Treasures gallery. This unique display features treasured objects from the Museum and WA's other cultural organisations.

Conference dinner

The conference dinner will be held at Fraser's Restaurant (60 Fraser Ave, West Perth WA 6005). Located within iconic Kings Park and overlooking the Perth CBD and Swan River, we encourage all delegates to join us for an evening to remember.

Field excursions

Places will be strictly limited and on a first come, first served basis. Note both the pre- and post-conference trips have minimum participant requirements and may be cancelled if there are insufficient registrations. Detailed booking information and itineraries will be circulated at a later date. To aid planning, we encourage those wanting to attend one or both of the field trips to use the 'expression of interest' form at the back of this circular to indicate their interest.

There are two field trips and an excursion on offer for PDU3:

Pre-conference

Precambrian palaeontology highlights package: 28 June – 7 July 2022 (approx. dates).

This trip will incorporate Pilbara early life sites, chain of beads (*Horodyskia williamsi*) localities, microbialite reefs of the Duck Creek Dolomite and the World Heritage Listed modern microbialites of Hamelin Pool (subject to change). **Field trip leaders:** David Flannery (QUT) and David Martin (GSWA).

Post-conference

Kalbarri and surrounds: 17–20 July 2023; approx. cost \$700 pp.; minimum participants = 12, maximum = 20.

Kalbarri is home to richly fossiliferous Cretaceous marine outcrops with diverse shark and marine reptile fauna, as well as early arthropod trackways in the Siluro-Ordovician Tumblagooda Sandstone. A day will be spent visiting various Cretaceous marine sites on Murchison House Station, with another day exploring the arthropod trackways in Kalbarri National Park. The journey to and from Kalbarri will also include stops at various sites of palaeontological interest, with details to be confirmed in due course. A reasonable level of fitness will be essential as most of the sites at Murchison House Station and in Kalbarri National Park entail hiking over rough terrain. **Field trip leaders:** Helen Ryan (WAM) and Arthur Mory (GSWA).

Mid-conference

A mid-conference excursion to Western Australia's Boola Bardip Museum, including free entry and guided talks in the galleries by subject specialists, is planned for the afternoon of **Wednesday 12 July**. This excursion will be offered to all conference participants at no additional cost.

Session proposals

To submit a session proposal, please nominate a convener/session chair, a session title and brief description (no more than 1–2 sentences). Send this proposal to palaeodownunder3@gmail.com with the subject line 'PDU3 session proposal'. Session proposals need to be received by **30 April 2023** for consideration.

AAP strongly encourages conveners to plan sessions with a diverse presenter profile, including those of various ages, genders, career levels and cultural backgrounds.

Call for abstracts, oral presentations and posters

Abstracts (for talks and posters) are due **30 April 2023**. A formal request for abstracts will be announced in January 2023, and will include submission guidelines and template, plus instructions for electronic submission.

A conference volume will be arranged alongside conference abstracts and proceedings, to be published as a special issue of *Alcheringa*. More information on paper submissions for this volume will be included in the call for abstracts.

Awards

Robert Etheridge Jr Medal

The Robert Etheridge Jr Medal recognises a researcher's lifetime contribution to Australasian palaeontology. Nominations for this award are currently open, and members are encouraged to submit worthy nominees for consideration.

Dorothy Hill Award

The Dorothy Hill Award recognises the best research paper within a calendar year by a middle career researcher as sole or first author. Only members are eligible for this award; members can self-nominate or be nominated by others.

Paleo Down Under Student awards

Prizes will also be awarded for the best student oral and best student poster presentations during PDU3, to be judged by members of the scientific and organising committees.

Student Travel Award

Students are encouraged to apply **now** for student travel awards to attend PDU3, or other palaeontology conferences of their choice.
